



## Rules of the game

The pile of cards is placed in the middle of the table face down.  
Each player chooses a counter and stands on the START.  
The players roll the dice, the roller with the highest number begins the game.

The first player moves forward according to the number of points on the dice. Next, the player takes the card from the top of the pile and says the sentence with a verb on it.

Depending on the colour of the field, the sentence must be as follows:

- |                        |                       |
|------------------------|-----------------------|
| the <b>red</b> field   | - a negative sentence |
| the <b>blue</b> field  | - a question          |
| the <b>green</b> field | - a positive sentence |

The player decides whether to use the Present Simple, the Present Continuous, the Past Simple, the Present Perfect or the Future Simple tense. The "key" words help to make a decision.

The player who says the sentence in the wrong tense, misses a turn.

When the player stands on the field with dices – he/she rolls the dice again.

Each player may come across a bad luck or a good luck field and then he/she moves according to the code on the field.

The player who first reaches the FINISH – wins the game.



# Answers key

2. ROLL THE DICE AGAIN!

3. **for** - Present Perfect e.g. My relatives have helped me for 10 years.

4. **tonight** - Present Continuous e.g. Are your friends meeting with you tonight?

5. **never** - Present Simple e.g. Kate never works at home.

or  
- Present Perfect e.g. Kate has never worked at home.

6. **always** - Present Simple e.g. I always decide about my next day in the evenings.

or  
- Present Perfect e.g. I've always decided about my next day in the evenings.

7. **in 2050** - Future Simple e.g. Will your brother design his house on his own?

8. GOOD LUCK! Fly to 17

9. **2 hours ago** - Past Simple e.g. She didn't play Lego blocks 2 hours ago.

10. **now** - Present Continuous e.g. His boss is taking important documents now.

11. **usually** - Present Simple e.g. Does you cousin usually invite all his family for parties?

13. **I think** - Future Simple e.g. I think employees won't work only 2 days in the Future.

14. **recently** - Present Perfect e.g. Our children have visited the zoo recently.

15. **at weekends** - Past Simple e.g. Do parents spend the time with children at weekends?

16. **probably...next year** - Future Simple e.g. Actors probably will start the new film next year.

17. **this week** - Present Continuous e.g. My family isn't moving the house this evening.

18. **ever** - Present Perfect e.g. Has your dad ever won the competition?

19. **often** - Present Simple e.g. My uncle doesn't often read books.

20. **hope** - Future Simple e.g. They hope they will get a pay rise in 2 months.
